


Remembering a colleague who served:

My father taught himself to read and write and never attended any school. He was an avid reader of war books, politics and history. He said he joined the Army to better himself and to serve his country.

One of our college community's Army Veterans remembers

Elvin Bates, WWII Army Veteran

"Even though his unit deployed through Normandy on June 6th, he did not tell me stories about guts and glory. He talked about the small things like not using a clutch on a Jeep submerged in water, picking up a different weapon he wanted to use, escorting German prisoners, and even dealing with unruly U.S. soldiers on late nights back at home. He said he is proud of the troops today because they volunteer; and he said even though he was drafted it was different because, "that's just what you had to do." He told me a lot of stories about, "just doing what you had to do." And it makes me think about how the Armed Forces are successful because of individuals making small decisions and taking action to get the job done and keep moving forward everyday. Elvin died one month before turning 100 years old in 2018. The week before his death, he was still building and selling beehives; just doing what he had to do until the very end."

"Drafted into the Marine Corps for Viet Nam and had to leave his first and newborn child for two years to serve. Shortly after returning, he joined the Army National Guard in WI, serving an additional 10 years in that unit before he was hired as the full-time ARNG as a regular-Army permanently-assigned member of that unit, where he served for more than another decade. His 26 years of service inspired many people (three of his four sons included) to join the military and is greatly appreciated!"

One of our college community's Army Veterans remembers

William C. Eherenman, Army Air Corps "W.C. joined the Army for WWII and became a pilot in the then Army Air Corps. He flew in many major battles and was eventually shot down, ejected from his plane, and parachuted onto an island in the Pacific Ocean. He sustained burns over 40% of his body, broke his leg in two places as well as an arm. Yet, he managed to cut himself loose from his parachute in the jungle canopy, crawl to a river, float down river, and get spotted by a rescue ship, an ordeal that lasted over four days. He became a faculty member at a major university and lived to affect many, many lives. His dedication and will to survive has been inspiring to so many!"
